# CELEBRATION OF THE WORD



#### 1.SCRIPTURE

Always read something from the Bible. It is God speaking to us! It could be a story, a parable or a short verse or line.



#### 2. SYMBOL

We become closer to God through signs and symbols.

Have something to look at, display a colour, and let everyone take part in symbolic action.

#### 3. SPEAK to GOD

Pray! This is speaking to God.

It might be a prayer you already know, one you have written, or one from a book.

#### 5. SENSES


LISTEN to; prayer, scripture, music.

SEE; candles and a symbol

TOUCH; a feely cross, Holy Water

SMELL; incense, candle

These help us create a sacred space and become closer to God.





#### 4. SILENCE

A little quiet time gives us the opportunity to speak to God quietly in the silence of our hearts.



#### 6. SACRED SPACE

Create a special space for your Liturgy. Sit together, get rid of books and water bottles! Move furniture.

#### A GLOSSARYof

#### **LITURGICAL TERMS**

#### FOR PRIMARY SCHOOLS

LITURGY: the participation of the people in the Work of God



#### **ALTAR**

The symbolic presence of Christ in the church building to which we bow. The main focus in the church, where the Liturgy of the Eucharist takes place.

#### **AMBO**

Where the Liturgy of the Word takes place. (May also be a lectern)



#### **ASSEMBLY**

The gathered people, members of the Mystical Body.

#### **BIBLE**

The Word of God. Sacred Scriptures. A collection of sacred books. Old Testament, 46 books New Testament 27 books

#### **BLESSING**

Asks God to look upon people or things. Traditionally, by a priest at Mass, but we can also bless each other.

#### **BOW**

An act of reverence. Simple bow of the head or a profound bow (hands to knees!)

#### **CANDLE**

Light is an important symbol. It represents Christ being the Light of the Word, conquering darkness.

#### CANTOR

A designated singer who leads the music.

#### CELEBRATE

To mark, honour, remember

#### CELEBRANT

The ordained deacon, priest, bishop who officiates at a liturgical celebration.

#### **CHALICE AND PATEN**

The cup and plate, vessels used to celebrate the Eucharist.



#### **CIBORIUM**

Similar to a chalice, usually with a lid, used for the consecrated hosts.

#### COLLECT

Prayer said by the priest just before the Liturgy of the Word. It 'collects' our petitions together.

#### **COLOUR (Liturgical)**

Vestments and cloths reflect the time if the liturgical year.

Green: Ordinary time

Red: Palm Sunday, Good Friday, Pentecost, feasts of apostles,

evangelists and martyrs. Purple: Lent and Advent

Rose; Mide Advent and Mid Lent

Sundays.

White: Christmas, Easter, feasts of the Lord, Mary angels and saints who

weren't martyrs.

Gold may be used on special occasions.

#### **CRUETS**

Small vessels for the water and wine used at Mass.



#### **EUCHARIST**

Greek for 'thanksgiving.' Celebration of the Eucharist as also known as Mass.

#### **FONT**

The receptacle used for Baptism.
Often wood or stone.



#### **GENUFLECT**

A liturgical posture to show reverence be touching the ground with a single knee.

#### **HOMILY**

Preaching during the Sunday Mass by the priest or deacon. It should be on scripture or text of the Mass.

#### **LECTIONARY**

The sacred book containing scripture readings for Mass.

#### **LECTOR**

A lay ministry. The person who reads scripture at Mass.



#### **LITANY**

A from of prayer. A list of saints, titles or petitions with a single response.

#### LITURGY OF THE WORD

The first major part of the Mass.
Old and New Testament readings,
Psalm, Gospel reading, Homily,
Universal Prayer (Bidding prayers)
We believe Christ is present in his Word.

#### LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

second major part of the Mass.
Bread and Wine are offered,
consecrated to become the Body and
Blood of Jesus.


#### LUNETTE

A small receptacle used for a single large consecrated host.



#### **MISSAL**

The liturgical book containing the texts of the Mass.



#### **MEDITATION**

A form of individual prayer/reflection focusing on a particular text or theme. Scripture, art, music, sacred writings can be the source of meditation.

#### **MONSTRANCE**

A receptacle to contain the Blessed Sacrament for Eucharistic Adoration and Benediction.



#### **PRAYER**

The way we communicate with God. Formal or informal.

Prayers are of praise, thanksgiving, petition(asking) and reconciliation (being sorry)

#### **PRESIDER**

The person who leads a liturgical service. The priest or deacon in a formal liturgy.

#### **PROCLAIM**

The Word of God isn't merely read. It is proclaimed. God speaks to us here and now!

#### **PYX**

A small container used to take Communion to the sick and housebound.



#### **REFLECTION**

To pray quietly and ponder a given theme.

#### **RITUAL**

Liturgy is Ritual. It is a tradition passed on. It is repeated. It allows us to become familiar and immerse ourselves in it.

#### **SACRAMENT**

An outward sign of an inward reality. By celebrating the 7 Sacraments we receive grace from God and become more like Him.

The Sacrament perpetuates God's

saving work, making it effective throughout the ages.

#### **SACRED SPACE**

Creating a sacred space in school allows the liturgy to be more effective. The combination of space, light, sign, symbol, music, scripture and silence work together to make God tangible.

#### **SCRIPTURE**

The sacred Word of God found in the Bible.

#### SIGN OF PEACE

A way of signifying peace with the people near us. A powerful symbolic action.

#### SILENCE

An integral part of liturgy. It needs to be taught and practiced. Through silence, we can speak to God, reflect and listen.

#### **TABERNACLE**

Usually behind the altar, the place where the Blessed Sacrament is kept for taking Communion to the sick and for private prayer. A large host is usually kept in a LUNETTE and can be places in a MONSTRANCE for EUCHARISTIC

#### **WORSHIP**

ADORATION.

The homage given to God acknowledging His greatness. It can be a public or private act.



# MEDITATION IN CLASS



#### 1. NATURE MEDITATION

Reflect on the wonders of God's creation.

#### 2. VIDEO MEDITATION

Allow images and sounds to take you closer to God.

#### 3. <u>IMAGINITIVE PRAYER</u>

Put yourself in the scene. Be close to Jesus!

#### 4. DAILY EXAMEN

Take a couple of minutes at the end of the day...

#### 5. ART MEDITATION

Colour an icon and listen to a passage of Scripture. What words or phrases do you notice! What is God saying to you?

#### 6. SCRIPTURAL MEDITATION

Reflect on a short passage from the Bible. Take your time and share your thoughts with God.

#### 7. STATIONS OF THE CROSS

At each Station, think about what Jesus has done for us.

#### 8. LECTIO DIVINA

Listen to the Word of God 2 or 3 times. What do you notice? What is God saying to you?

#### 9. THE ROSARY

Pray a decade of the Rosary and think about Jesus' life and what message He might be giving to you!



# OPPORTUNITIES FOR CLASS PRAYER IN THE RELIGIOUS EDUCATION DIRECTORY



#### **EYFS**

The words and actions of the sign of the cross:

'In the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen'.

Simple 'circle time ' prayers, repeated 3 times:

God made me.

God loves me.

God loves everyone.

God made the wonderful world.

God is love.

Jesus look after me.

Look after God's world.

I am sorry Jesus.

Key religious words and phrases from Scripture, hymns, and prayers.

Listen attentively and respond to Bible and religious stories

Express themselves when responding to songs and hymns they have listened to and learned.

Say sorry.

Shake hands to share peace with their friends.

Repeat and enjoy phrases from Scripture, including psalms and hymns.

Sing and perform a range of rhymes, songs, and new and traditional hymns

#### YEAR 1

Reflect the Our Father and the opening words of the Creed

Hear and join in Hail Mary

Some simple words, actions, and symbols from the Ash Wednesday liturgy and the Palm Sunday liturgy.

The words of the 'Glory Be' prayer.

An age-appropriate hymn referencing the Holy Spirit.

#### YEAR 2

Psalms are prayers of praise to God

Some words of Mary's prayer, the Magnificat

How water is used as a symbol of a new start in the Sacrament of Baptism.

How Catholics say sorry to God in prayers:

Act of Sorrow (Contrition)

Asking for forgiveness in the 'Our Father'

A simple Examen or an act of sorrow and in the Penitential rite, for example, the Kyrie Eleison (Lord have Mercy).

Some simple words, actions, and symbols of the Easter Vigil, focusing on light and water.

Christians pray to the Holy Spirit for help ('Come Holy Spirit').

#### YEAR 3

Extracts from a psalm of Creation.

How the praise of Creation is expressed in the prayer and Liturgy of the Church

Eg sFrancis's Canticle of the Creatures; the Offertory prayers; a Prayer for our Earth in Laudato Si').

How Catholics use some signs, actions, prayers, and symbols to celebrate Mass, e.g., the sign of the cross, bells, the Kyrie Eleison prayer, etc.

Hear some of the responses Catholics say at Mass, focusing on the Liturgy of the Word.

How Advent hymns celebrate Jesus as the coming Messiah (e.g., O Little town of Bethlehem; Long ago prophets knew; O come, divine Messiah; O come, O come Emmanuel).

Our Father

Some prayers and responses Catholics say during Mass.

Some prayers and responses Catholics sing during the Eucharistic Prayer.

Some ways people celebrate their first Eucharist (First Holy Communion).

Sign of the Cross

#### YEAR 4

Age-appropriate extracts from prayers of faith in God from the Catholic tradition. (For example, Ps 40:1, the St Therese prayer, 'May today there be peace within', St John Henry Newman's 'Mission of my Life', Bl Charles de Foucauld's 'Prayer of Abandonment.')

'He will come again in glory' from the Nicene Creed.

The Apostles Creed

Some Marian prayers or hymns, e.g., Hail Mary, the Angelus, the Rosary, the Magnificat, Ave Maria.

#### YEAR 5

Some words of Psalm 23 to speak or sing.

O Antiphons

O come O come Emmanuel

The Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary

Prayers of Petition

Our Father

Virtues of Faith, hope and love

- What the ashes on Ash Wednesday symbolise.
- A simple examen and/or act of contrition.

#### **EYFS**

Listen to scripture

Take part in circle prayer with help

Participate in short periods of silence

#### YEAR 1

Lay out altar with help
Listen to scripture
Take part in circle prayer with help
Participate in short periods of silence.

#### YEAR 2

Lay out altar
Help select and read scripture
Make up own circle prayer
Increasing comfort with periods of silence

#### YEAR 3

Lay out altar with some guidance.
Select theme for scripture.
Make own circle prayer and use symbols.
Spend time in silence.

#### YEAR 4

Set up altar independently
Prepare reading and psalm (help may be given)
Improvise circle prayer.
Select prayers for use
Using ICT, select images to be used for reflection.

#### **YEAR 5/6**

Set up altar independently, being increasingly creative.

Select reading and prayers from a variety of sources (Bible, books, workbooks, web etc.)

Compose prayers in different styles to match given needs.

Match prayers and readings with a given theme.

Prayers become increasingly detailed in what they are asking for, the reasons why, and what they want the outcome to be.

Create ICT aids (eg powerpoints/photostory)

Search for visual aids( eg from a bank of Youtube videos / Google image/CADOD resources) Invent own symbolic actions.

Spend increasing amounts of time in silence.

 As soon as pupils are able, allow them to prepare, and pray independently, assisting only where needed.
